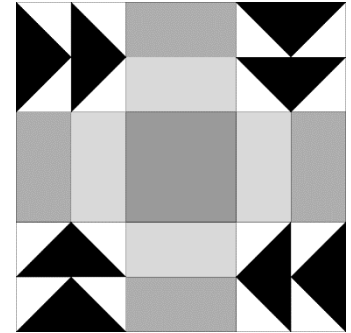


2024 BOM, Celebrate Halloween

Trick or Treat

Halloween (All Hallows Eve)

This holiday was once tied to farming and astronomy! It marked the end of the harvest season and the beginning of winter or “darker half” of the year. Now, we have pumpkins, witches, ghosts, and children in costumes laughing on their way to collect their candy.



Dark Fabric:

16 squares, 2 1/2" x 2 1/2"

Light Fabric:

4 rectangles, 2 1/2" x 4 1/2"

Center Square: cut 1 square, 4 1/2" x 4 1/2". Use either the medium fabric or fussy cut an image.

Medium:

4 rectangles, 2 1/2" x 4 1/2"

Background

8 rectangles, 2 1/2" x 4 1/2"

Directions:

Center Square

Use the 4 1/2" x 4 1/2" rectangle, either medium fabric or fussy cut.

Sides

Sew a light rectangle to a medium rectangle, matching long sides. Make 4 units.



Corner squares

Take one of the dark 2 1/2" x 4 1/2" rectangles and lay one of the background 2 1/2" squares on one half. Sew on the diagonal line and trim 1/4" away from the sewn line (Figure 1). Press out and your piece should look like figure 2. Repeat on the other side with a second 2 1/2" square. Make a total of 8.

Sew 2 of the flying geese blocks according to figure 3. Make 4 units.

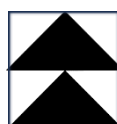

Finishing:

Assemble in horizontal rows according to the shaded diagram. Pay attention to the orientation of the flying geese units.
