Making Quilling Memories

Rachel Wallis spoke on "Storytelling and Quilts" at CQC's February meeting in Boulder. "Quilts tell family stories of births, weddings, deaths, women's issues and history," Rachel said.

She explained how during the Civil War, women made quilts to sell to raise money for the soldiers. They embroidered messages into quilts before sending them to the men on the lines. When soldiers died, the quilts were often claimed by other soldiers who used them to keep warm. Those that were brought home were in tatters.

Rachel discussed the Ohio Star block that dates to the 1800s in Oberlin, Ohio, and intertwines with the history of abolitionist John Brown's raid on Harpers Ferry. Brown recruited Lewis Sheridan Leary for that effort. Leary was killed shortly after the raid. Leary's wife, Mary Patterson Leary, learned of her husband's death when a shawl he'd worn was returned to her riddled with bullet holes. Following his death, she began piecing Ohio Star quilt blocks, recognized as honoring those who fought and died to end slavery.

Rachel shared additional stories of Lucinda Ward Honstain's 1867 Reconciliation Quilt, Esther Nisenthal Kinitz's embroidered fabric collages remembering her family's Holocaust experience, the making of feedsack quilts during the Great Depression, Kathryn Clark's foreclosure quilts, Fran Sharp's climate change quilt, and two of her own projects: "Unraveling Empire," a quilt that maps the intersections of the textile industry and the global slave trade of the 18th and 19th centuries, and "Inheritance: Quilting Across Prison Walls."

Some of us have found quilts in attics that impart stories of past events, and we make quilts to remind us of times of pain and happiness. My family tends to tuck our quilts away to keep them "pristine," ready to speak to the future. I wonder what will happen to my quilts and those I've inherited. Will my son and daughter keep them? Will my grandchildren remember me through my quilts? Will they be passed on to the next generation?

Thinking about our 2020 CQC theme — Quilting Into the Roaring '20s — I realized I know about family members who lived in the 1920s because they shared their stories through quilts. I have three quilts from my great-grandmother, who lived in Lucerne, Colorado. My uncle told me she had a closet full of quilts. Quilting in Place During COVID-19

Here's how your CQC officers are navigating this time of social distancing.

President Laural Hoppes: I have two embroidery projects I work on when I watch TV at night. I'm also binding a door prize for a future CQC meeting. I decided to finish a couple of UFOs. One's a table runner; the other is PJs for my husband. Next I'll tackle finishing a quilt top. I finished the blocks in November but haven't found the right way to put them together. There are hundreds of "Y" seams so it will take awhile. Since I don't have the grandkids, I will lay the blocks out on the basement floor to make the decisions.

1st Vice President for Membership Pat Cleaveland: We often wish for time to quilt. My mother used to tell me to be careful what I wished for. I'm determined to finish a quilt I started last fall when I stayed with my grandsons and their menagerie for 10 days. When I sit down to put a block together, I remember that time with three teens, five 6-week-old puppies and their parents, a friendly but untrustworthy parrot, a cat, two parakeets, and a large lizard. The quilt has thousands of scrappy pieces with no fast or easy way to assemble the blocks — an appropriate design for a time of uncertainty. I hope all CQC members have a memorable project for our shelter-athome time.

2nd Vice President for Programs Dana Jones: COVID-19 arrived as I had two more sessions of Quilting 101 to teach so I've spent the last few weeks preparing

Recording Secretary Betty Andrews: We are going a little crazy here at the hospital because everyone who can be spared is going around with buckets of bleach solution disinfecting any surface that can be reached. Beyond work, I have cut out a quilt for the Quilt-a-Fair quilt show but all my other sewing has been face masks.

Treasurer Mary Rush: I always laugh when people ask me what I am working on. I stay so busy with CQC duties and other social things, I really don't have time to sew. Guess what the Corona virus has done for me? I may actually finish something. Kidding aside, please take care of yourselves and each other. I'll be really glad to see all of you again in the not too distant future.

Past President Dawn Mills: I am varying my activities: reading, resting, praying, watching the news, trying new recipes, watching movies (mostly comedies) and checking in on friends. I have reassessed my UFOs to see where I am and what I need to work on next. I have some piecing— hand and machine some blocks to construct, a binding or two, and work on a 120"x120" Hawai'ian quilt my mom was working on. If I spend an hour a day on it, I might make some serious progress while social distancing.



10 Ways To Ease Anxiety

No. 1: Coloring relieves stress. Googgling quilt-related coloring books turns up many choices, and several of the quilt magazines include coloring pages.

No 2: Reading or listening to books can take you away from daily stress. Try a quilt-themed novel, especially one by Coloradan Sandra Dallas. If you haven't read *The Patchwork Bride*, now is a good time to check it out. If nonfiction is more your cup of tea, and you haven't read *The Quilt That Walked to Golden*, go for it.

No. 3: Breaking out some handwork can relax you. Think embroidery, English paper piecing and Hawai'ian appliqué as just a few possibilities.

No. 4: Exercise is a good counter to anxiety so go for exercises that will relieve the aches and pains associated with quilting. For a starting point, check out these suggestions from the American Quilters Society: <u>http://www.aqsblog.-</u>com/ten-exercises-for-quilters.

No. 5: Music can soothe the soul or get you dancing. Check out this fun song from Cathy Miller, the Singing Quilter: <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?</u> <u>v=M0QjV8K4vQM</u>

No. 6: Playing a game or doing a jigsaw puzzle is a past time that can take your mind off our current situation for awhile. If you're social distancing with others in your household, try a game of Quiltopoly. If you're on your own, try one of the many quilt-themed jigsaw puzzles.

No. 7: Pour yourself a cup of herbal tea and curl up under a quilt as you read one or more quilt magazines.

No. 8: Journaling or sketching can help you process ideas that may be keeping you awake at night. You never know. Something you write or draw could inspire your next quilt design or palette.

No. 9: Sort through a box, drawer or bin of fabric, remembering when you acquired each piece and thinking about how you might use it or donate it.

No. 10: Pull out a UFO that you now have time to work on. Don't stress if you don't finish it. Celebrate whatever progress you make.

President Laural Hoppes called the meeting to order at 6 p.m. Thirteen members were present. President Laural Hoppes: The newsletter position cannot be appointed by the president. There will be an announcement in the April newsletter asking for people to apply.

1st Vice President for Membership Pat Cleaveland: The roster is at the printer and will hopefully be ready by the March meeting. There will be 213 copies of the March newsletter mailed to members plus an extra 25 copies printed. The membership was purged March 2. There are 503 members. Pat dropped businesses that had not renewed in two years.

1st Vice President for Programs 2020 Dana Jones reported on workshop attendance and locations for future workshops.

Recording Secretary Betty Andrews: Minutes of the last meeting were approved.

Treasurer Mary Rush: The treasurer's report was submitted and accepted. Total assets \$48,156.50.

Past President Dawn Mills: The council needs a communication committee to coordinate the best way to send out information.

Committee reports were submitted to the board for review.

New Business: The board discussed how to deal with the COVID-19 virus. The board agreed to ask membership to approve that \$5,000 be committed to reserves in the 2020 budget. Work continued on bylaw updates.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:55 p.m.

Your Questions on CQC Rosters and Newsletters Answered

CQC's 2020 membership rosters are now available for pick up at general meetings. The council doesn't mail them because of the cost to do so but if you cannot get to a meeting, ask a friend to pick one up for you or let Pat Cleaveland know, and she'll get one to you. The roster is a handy reference guide to CQC members and bylaws. Only members whose dues were current March 1 are included in the roster.

From time to time, members report they haven't received the CQC newsletter. Here are the most common reasons:

• Newsletters are mailed bulk mail to save shipping costs. The Post Office does not forward bulk mail to new or temporary addresses. If you will be gone for even a month, let Pat know by the 25th of the month before the next issue, and she will save a copy for you. If you don't change your address with Pat before the mailing list is sent to the printer each month, the Post Office will return the newsletter postage due. This costs CQC

from \$1.20 to \$1.50 for each issue in addition to the original printing and mailing costs. By the time the Post Office returns the newsletter to CQC, it may be too late to catch the next month's issue.

- If you are moving, the Post Office will not forward your bulk mailed newsletter even if you have completed their form with your new address. Please notify Pat of your new or changed address by the 25th of the month to receive the next issue.
- The Post Office has up to three weeks to deliver bulk mail. If they are busy or short on carriers, the newsletter may not come before the meeting. This happened in January when many members received their newsletters after the monthly meeting.
- Sometimes the Post Office returns a newsletter to COC with a notice that the address does not exist. Often the address hasn't changed. A temporary or

new carrier may make this error. There's not much CQC can do about this.

- CQC wants you to get your newsletter in the format you requested. To deal with some of these issues, an email goes out the week before the meeting just in case you didn't get the newsletter in a timely fashion. CQC orders about 25 extra copies from the printer each month for new members and to replace missing or late newsletters. These can be picked up at the general meetings while the supply lasts.
- Current and past issues of the newsletter are on the website at coloradoquiltingcouncil.com. New issues are posted by the 10th of the month. If you do not have computer access, ask a family member or friend to go to the website and download the newsletter until the problem is resolved.

Have Sewing Machine, Make Face Masks: How to Get It Right

You've likely seen calls for people to sew face masks for those needing them during the COVID-19 health crisis. CQC thanks our February speaker Rachel Wallis for ideas on best practices. Before you begin sewing, know where you will send the masks to ensure you make what that facility wants to avoid deluging overburdened health-care workers with donations they can't use. It appears medical centers will use homemade masks for patients and non-COVID-19 procedures to stretch the supply of the professional personal pro-



tection equipment needed by medical workmany pattern sources:

ers. A few of Health-care providers recommend using new, prewashed, tightly woven cotton canvas or duck cloth for mask exteriors and 100 percent cotton flannel for interiors. Include a pocket for removable filters. Light-colored solid and non-patterned fabrics are preferable. Do not use elastic that contains latex.



Love a Mystery? Part 2 'Streamers' Quilt

by Carol Cook

Clue 1 for CQC's 2020 mystery quilt -"Streamers" — was revealed in CQC's fabrics in these blocks. March newsletter, pages 14 and 15. That clue included the materials list and instructions for Block X, a Modified Log Cabin block. This month, we'll make Variable Star blocks in two color combinations. Pay careful attention to the place-

ment of Color A (red) and Color C (blue)

Please read all instructions before beginning. Basic quilt-making and rotarycutting skills are assumed. All dimensions include 1/4" seam allowances unless otherwise indicated.

Accurate cutting and piecing are needed. It is recommended that you sew the first unit of each step then measure and adjust your seam allowances as needed to achieve the correct size. Then make the rest of the same units.

The final clue will be published in May.

Cutting Instructions

Color A (red):

- Cut 4 strips 3" by width of fabric (WOF); subcut into 48 squares, each 3" x 3"
- Cut 2 strips 5¹/₂" by WOF; subcut into 12 squares, each 5¹/₂" x 5½"
- Cut 2 strips 6¼" by WOF; subcut into 12 squares, each 6¼" x 6¼"

Color B (white):

Label these squares as it is easy to get them confused. Trust me.

- Cut 9 strips 3³/₈" by WOF; subcut into 96 squares, each 3³/₈" x 3³/₈"
- Cut 8 strips 3" by WOF; subcut into 96 squares, each 3" x 3" Color C (blue):
- Cut 4 strips 3" by WOF; subcut into 48 squares, each 3" x 3"
- Cut 2 strips 5¹/₂" by WOF; subcut into 12 squares, each 5¹/₂" x 5½"
- Cut 2 strips 6¼" by WOF; subcut into 12 squares, each 6¼" x 6¼"

Set aside the rest of your fabrics to be used in the next clue.





Flying Geese Unit 1 (FG1) -

Mark the 96 Color B (white) 3³/₈" squares diagonally from corner to corner on the wrong side of the fabric.

Place another Color B (white) 3%" square on the Color A (red) triangle, right sides together. The marked diagonal line should run from the center of the unit to the outside corner as shown. See Figure 3.

Sew a scant $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam on each side of the marked diagonal line..



Use a rotary cutter to cut on the marked diagonal line. Press the remaining small triangles back to make four Flying Geese units. Trim the Flying Geese units to $3^{\circ} \times 5\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$. See Figure 4.

Repeat using all 12 Color A (red) $6\frac{1}{4}$ " squares and 48 Color B (white) $3\frac{3}{8}$ " squares to make 48 Flying Geese Unit 1s.



Flying Geese Unit 2 (FG2)

Using the remaining 48 marked Color A (white) 3%" squares and 12 Color C (blue) $6\frac{1}{4}$ " squares, repeat the instructions above to make 48 Flying Geese Unit 2s. See Figure 5.

Making Flying Geese Units for Variable Star Blocks Y & Z

Square-in-a-Square Unit 1 (SIS1)

Mark the 96 Color B (white) 3" squares diagonally from corner to corner on the wrong side of the fabric then lay two color B (white) 3" squares on opposite corners of a Color A (red) $5\frac{1}{2}$ " square, right sides together. The marked lines should run across the corners. Sew on the marked diagonal line. See Figure 6.



Use a rotary cutter to cut ¼" outside of the marked line as shown. See Figure 7.



Press the small Color B (white) triangles back from the Color A (red) square, then place another two Color B (white) $3^{"}$ squares on each of the remaining corners, right sides together, as shown. Sew on the marked diagonal line. Use a rotary cutter to cut a $\frac{1}{4}^{"}$ outside of the marked lines. See Figure 8.

Press the remaining small Color B (white) triangles back to make a SIS1 unit as shown. Measure the SIS1 unit and, if needed, trim to $5\frac{1}{2}$ " x $5\frac{1}{2}$ ". See Figure 9.

Repeat using all 12 Color A (red) 5¹/₂" squares and 48 Color B (white) 3" squares to make 12 SIS1 units.



Square-in-a-Square 2 (SIS2)

Using the remaining 48 Color B (white) 3" squares and 12 Color C (blue) 51/2" squares, repeat the instructions above to make 12 SIS2 units. See Figure 10.

Making Variable Star Blocks Y & Z

Pay careful attention to the placement of the Color A (red) and Color C (blue) fabrics in these blocks.

Variable Star Block Y

Sew a SIS1 (Color A, red, center), 4 FG2 units (Colors B and C, white and blue) and 4 Color C (blue) 3" squares together as shown. Press seams toward the Color C (blue) 3" squares and the SIS1 units. See Figure 11.

The block should measure $10\frac{1}{2}$ " x $10\frac{1}{2}$ ". Adjust seam allowances as needed.

Repeat using all 12 SIS1 units, 48 FG1 units and 48 Color C (blue) 3" squares to make 12 Variable Star Y blocks, which have Color A (red) centers, Color B (white) stars and Color C (blue) backgrounds. See Figure 11.

Variable Star Block Z

Sew a SIS2 (Color C, blue, center), 4 FG1 units (Colors A and B, red and white) and 4 Color A (red) 3" squares together as shown. Press seams toward the Color A (red) 3" squares and the SIS2 units. See Figure 12.

The block should measure $10\frac{1}{2}$ " x $10\frac{1}{2}$ ". Adjust seam allowances as needed. Repeat using all 12 SIS2 units, 48 FG2 units and 48 Color A (red) 3" squares to make 12 Variable Star Z blocks, which have Color C (blue) centers, Color B (white) stars and Color A (red) backgrounds. See Figure 12.

Block Directions

This block finishes at 7" x 7" in the quilt. That means the block you submit should be $7\frac{1}{2}$ " x $7\frac{1}{2}$ ". Make the background from white fabric and the "bow-tie" portion of the block from a print/colored fabric that is the same within each block. A variety of print/colored fabrics may be used when making multiple blocks.

Cutting

White fabric: Cut two 4" x 4" squares. Print/colored fabric:

- Cut two 2" x 2" squares
- Cut two 4" x 4" squares




Assembly

Step 1: Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of each 2" x 2" print/colored square.

Step 2: Place a marked 2" x 2" square on one corner of each 4" x 4" print/colored square, right sides together, raw edges aligned.

Step 3: Stitch on the diagonal line.



Step 4: Trim away the corners ¼" beyond the stitching line.



Step 5: Press the print/colored corner out so that each 4" x 4" white square has a corner of print/colored fabric.



Step 6: Sew together a 4" x 4" print/ colored square and a white square with a print/colored corner. Repeat.



Step 7: Sew the two sections from Step 6 together to complete the block. The unfinished block will measure $7\frac{1}{2}$ " x $7\frac{1}{2}$ ".




Book Review: Child's Play Quilts by Stacey Day

Stacey Day's book Child's Play Quilts (C&T Publishing/Stash Books, 2018) includes patterns for 20 contemporary baby quilts that range in size from 38" x 51" to 60" x 72", each shown in two colorways — one cool colors and one warm colors.

Color Play Quilts begins with a discussion on choosing fabrics, using the color wheel and combining colors. The patterns are designed to be made with a variety of fabrics and are suited to using scraps from your fabric stash. Stacey has included a section on how to build and organize your stash and offers hints on smart fabric buying to improve your stash.

Several of the projects in the book use "slabs," which are created by sewing small similar-hued scraps together into larger more usable pieces of fabric. Stacey uses the slabs for appliqué shapes and for



techniques needed for projects in the book, such as chain piecing, nesting seams, raw-edge appliqué and curved piecing.

There are seven projects with appliquéd shapes, such as raindrops (perfect for a baby shower gift), hearts, stars, moons, lady bugs (very cute), circles and fans. These quilts can be made from scraps, slabs or a combination of both. The quil-

> Baby quilts are a good way to try out new techniques or patterns without committing the amount of fabric and time needed to make larger, bed-sized quilts. If you don't have a family member, friend or co-worker needing a baby quilt, consider donating one to one of our local nonprofit organizations such as ABC Quilts or Firehouse Quilts. Child's Play Quilts by Stacey Day is one of 84 books on baby or children's quilts in the CQC Library.
